A NOTE FROM JOHN SCHAEFER

We began presenting silent films with live music in the Winter Garden atrium just over twenty years ago. It seemed clear to me, at the beginning, that offering a work of art that was complete, and completely silent, to a contemporary musician was a rare opportunity. Creative artists often say there's nothing they dread more than the blank page; well, with these films, you get a page full of storytelling – but one that is practically begging for a second story, a sonic one, to be told along with it. That's the sort of thing that can really inspire a musician, and we've had some live soundtracks that have veered into wonderfully unexpected directions.

But a second reason has emerged over the years for continuing this process: these films, some of them over a century old, are still relevant today. This of course is the property of art, to transcend the time in which it was made. But it's also a measure of how the themes in these movies keep recurring through the years. Take this year's program, for example. Alexis Cuadrado has chosen films that deal with immigration (Chaplin's The Immigrant), income inequality (The Land Beyond the Sunset), and gender roles (in two very short films by Alice Guy-Blaché, the first female director). Vernon Reid became fascinated by the theme of "the other" - a theme that has long manifested itself in horror stories. He's chosen the 1910 version of Frankenstein and the remarkable Tod Browning masterpiece The Unknown. (That latter stars the famous Lon Chaney and a young, unknown Joan Crawford.)

Finally, the UK trio GoGo Penguin has re-scored a contemporary silent film classic, Godfrey Reggio's Koyaanisqatsi. Originally created with composer Philip Glass (whose score is one of his best-known works), Koyaanisqatsi deals with mankind's questionable stewardship of the earth, and the choices we've made with regard to technology. ("Koyaanisqatsi" is a Hopi word that means "life out of balance.") In taking a silent film that already had a soundtrack and creating something entirely new for it, GoGo Penguin has actually stepped right into the tradition of old silent films, where each screening was a chance for a live musician or band to try something new. And of course, the film itself is part of a long lineage of movies that are driven not just by the technology available to the director, but by the power of his—or her—ideas.

About Vernon Reid

London-born lead guitarist, founder of Living Colour and a cofounder of the Black Rock Coalition, Vernon Reid has done a great deal to undermine stereotypical expectations of what kinds of music black artists ought to play. His rampant eclecticism encompasses everything from hard rock and punk to funk, R&B and avant-garde jazz, and his anarchic, lightning-fast solos have become a hallmark. In 1980, he joined Ronald Shannon Jackson's

Decoding Society, and over the course of the decade, Reid went on to work with a wide variety of experimental musicians including Defunkt, Bill Frisell, John Zorn, Arto Lindsay, and Public Enemy. He has continued with extended collaborations as a producer and performer with James "Blood" Ulmer's Memphis Blood, with DJ Logic in Yohimbe Brothers, the collaborative Burnt Sugar Arkestra, and the Tony Williams Tribute band "Spectrum Road" with Jack Bruce, John Medeski and Cindy Blackman-Santana. His latest project "The Zig Zag Power Trio" features Will Calhoun and Melvin Gibbs. Reid has also scored projects for celebrated filmmakers such as Derek Wan, Shula Chen, Thomas Allan Harris, Brad Lichtenstein, and Shola Lynch.

About GoGo Penguin

Manchester-based leftfield piano trio GoGo Penguin are Chris Illingworth, piano; Nick Blacka, bass; and Rob Turner, drums. Their music has been described as acoustic-electronica, but they draw equally on rock, jazz and minimalism, computer game soundtracks and glitchy-electronica to create their unique music. Their 2014 album v2.0 (Gondwana Records) was named a Mercury Prize album of the year alongside albums from Damon Albarn, Young Fathers, and Jungle. In 2015, they signed to Blue Note Records and released the albums Man Made Object in 2016 and A Humdrum Star in 2018. Their EP, Ocean in a Drop (Music

for Film) was released in October 2019 and they are currently recording a new album for release in 2020. For further information, visit gogopenguin.co.uk.

Originally scored by Philip Glass, *Koyaanisqatsi* is a remarkable cinematic masterpiece and one of the band's favorite films because of its powerful fusion of music and image. In 2015, GoGo Penguin wrote and performed their new score for the film as part of the opening season of HOME – a new center for international contemporary art, theatre, and film in Manchester, UK.

GoGo Penguin's richly emotional music offers a perfect contemporary dialogue with Reggio's profound images. Moving from fragile beauty to powerful frenzy their rich new score reflects the original themes of the film and in performance offers an overwhelming audio-visual experience that will appeal to fans of GoGo Penguin and cult cinema in equal measure.
